
APPARENT OPIOID-RELATED **DEATHS IN CANADA IN 2016***

The opioid epidemic in Canada is a national public health crisis; however, it hasn't affected all provinces and territories equally.






X The number of deaths involving fentanyl more than doubled between the beginning of 2016 and the beginning of 2017.




In 2016, the percentage of deaths involving fentanyl varies notably across provinces and territories, for example:






5 70 of apparent opioid-related deaths occurred among men

among women




In British Columbia and Alberta,

77% of deaths were among **MEN**.



28% of apparent opioid-related deaths in 2016 occurred among individuals in the 30 to 39 year age group.

- > Blue lips or nails
- > Dizziness and confusion
- > Can't be woken up
- > Choking, gurgling or snoring sounds
- > Slow, weak or no breathing
- > Drowsiness or difficulty staying awake

SUSPECT AN OVERDOSE?

- **CALL 911**
- Administer naloxone if you have it
- Stay with the person until help arrives
