New Brunswick¹

- is on the east coast of Canada
- borders Nova Scotia and Quebec in Canada, and Maine in the United States of America
- is Canada's only officially bilingual (French and English) province and a vibrant Acadian
- grows more diverse as new immigrants arrive

The Greater Moncton region

- is in the province of New Brunswick
- includes the cities of Moncton, Dieppe, and the town of Riverview
- is one of the fastest-growing urban area in Canada
- is diverse

Greater Moncton is known for its rich natural beauty. Winters are cold and snowy with an average daily low temperature of -12°C in January. Summers are warm with an average daily high of 25°C in July.

Living, working and going to school

Greater Moncton is a great place to develop careers, do business, study, and live a fulfilling life.

You can find jobs in Greater Moncton in industries such as

- transportation
- construction
- insurance

- tourism
- health
- education

As of April 2023, the official minimum wage is \$14.75 an hour.

Housing costs vary. The <u>average price to buy a single-family house</u> is approximately \$535,000. <u>Renting a 2-bedroom apartment could cost approximately \$1,100 per month.</u>

There are many <u>schools</u>, daycares, and after school programs in Greater Moncton in both English and French. In Canada, students usually go to school from kindergarten (age 3 or 4) to grade 12 (age 17 or 18). After that, they can go to college or university or start working.

There are also four community colleges where you can study in New Brunswick

- New Brunswick College of Craft and Design
- Maritime College of Forest Technology
- Collège communautaire du Nouveau-Brunswick
