

Distinguishing Features of

APHYLAXIS

RAPID ONSET OF SYMPTOMS

(within **minutes** up to **4 hours**) which include:



SKIN

• urticaria • pruritus • angioedema • flushing



RESPIRATORY

- cough wheeze dyspnea
- bronchospasm distress



GASTROINTESTINAL

- nausea
 vomiting
- diarrhea · severe abdominal pain



CARDIOVASCULAR

- tachycardia hypotension syncope
- dizziness arrhythmias



CENTRAL NERVOUS SYSTEM

- irritability sense of doom
- reduced level of consciousness

If you suspect anaphylaxis, a rapid response is critical.

Steps

Public Health



should be done promptly and simultaneously.

- Direct someone to call 911 (where available) or emergency medical services
- Assess airway, breathing, circulation
- Place the individual on their back and elevate lower extremities
- Inject EPINEPHrine intramuscularly into mid-anterolateral thigh (refer to epinephrine dosage table)
- Repeat **every 5 minutes** if not improving
