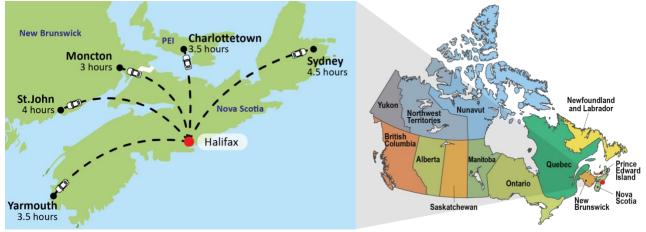




# Welcome Home - Halifax, Nova Scotia

• is the largest city in the province of Nova Scotia

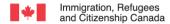
#### Nova Scotia<sup>1</sup>

- is located in Atlantic Canada, which also includes the provinces of New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, and Newfoundland and Labrador
- is home to Canada's largest naval base

Halifax is known for its historical charm, community spirit, fresh seafood, and incredible landscapes. Winters are cold and snowy, with an average daily low of -7°C in January. Summers are warm, with an average daily high of 23°C in July.

You can enjoy <u>public parks</u> and outdoor spaces in the summer, and fun activities like skiing, sledding and skating in the winter.

## Living, working and going to school

Halifax is a great place to develop careers, do business, study, and live a fulfilling life.

You can find jobs in Halifax in industries such as

- agriculture
- fishing
- mining
- forestry

- banking
- hospitality
- shipping ports

As of April 1, 2023, the official minimum wage in Nova Scotia is \$14.50 an hour.

Housing costs vary. The <u>average price to buy a single-family house</u> is approximately \$755,000. <u>Renting a 2-bedroom apartment could cost approximately \$1,500 a month.</u>

There are many <u>schools</u>, daycares, and after-school programs in both English and <u>French</u>. In Canada, students usually go to school from kindergarten (age 3 or 4) to grade 12 (age 17 or 18). After that, they can go to college or university or start working.

Nova Scotia has 10 public <u>universities</u>, with the following within 100 kilometres driving distance from Halifax:

- <u>Dalhousie University</u> (three campuses in Halifax and one in Truro)
- Mount Saint Vincent University
- NSCAD University

- Université Sainte-Anne
- University of King's College
- Saint Mary's University

Nova Scotia also has an extensive <u>community college</u> with 14 campuses across 17 communities in the province, including Halifax.

You can play many sports, like
