Faith Community Reintegration Project Services

What are Faith Community Reintegration Project (FCRP) Services?

FCRP services have been available since 2015. They support successful offender reintegration following their release from our institutions by:

- bridge-building between offenders and their identified religious and spiritual community groups
- liaising with parole, justice organizations and faith communities
- helping offenders connect with family members
- developing faith community capacity to engage with offenders
- offering support and assistance to offenders to become contributing members of society

Directed Faith Community Reintegration Project (D-FCRP)

D-FCRPs are a specialized extension of FCRPs that align with CSC's public safety mandate by supporting the reintegration of offenders from traditionally underserved faith communities.

Contributing to successful reintegration

FCRP/D-FCRP services strengthen relationships between faith communities and newly released offenders. They:

- provide support to offenders who wish to make or to restore connections to faith groups in the community
- provide a range of services and activities that facilitate an offender's transition and reintegration back into the community
- facilitate offender involvement in diverse, faith-based and pro-social activities

Where are FCRP services available?

- Atlantic Region
 - Moncton, Fredericton and Saint John, New Brunswick
 - Halifax, Nova Scotia
 - St. John's, Newfoundland
- Quebec Region
 - Montreal, Granby, Quebec City and Gatineau, Quebec
- Ontario Region
 - Kingston, London, Toronto, Peterborough, Ottawa, Ontario
- Prairie Region
 - Calgary and Edmonton, Alberta
 - Saskatoon and Regina, Saskatchewan
 - Winnipeg, Manitoba
- Pacific Region
 - Kelowna, Vancouver and Victoria, British Columbia

Where are D-FCRP services available?

- Atlantic Region: Halifax, Nova Scotia
 - To support Black Offenders
- Ontario Region: Greater Toronto Area
 - To support Muslim Offenders
- Pacific Region: Fraser Valley
 - To support Sikh Offenders

How do offenders access FCRP and D-FCRP services?

Incarcerated offenders can talk to an institutional chaplain, or released offenders can talk to their community parole officer for information on FCRP/D-FCRP services. More information is accessible on the [Quick Facts](#) for offenders.
