## Rationale for Proposed 2026 CFNS Licence Fee Increase

The CFNS Board of Directors has approved a 2026 budget that will require an increase in the CFNS licence fee from \$1.67/100 kgs to \$1.68/100 kgs effective March 8, 2026 (A-201).

CFNS last increased its licence fee in A-194 to cover the addition of a full-time auditor/Small Flock Program Coordinator. The proposed increase for 2026 is simply to cover inflation. Routine expenses in the 2026 budget are 2.8% higher than the 2025 budget. (Actual expenses for 2025 were well below budget as we ran short-handed for half the year.) The licence fee/kg would increase by 0.6% and a projected 2.6% increase in allocation/production for 2026 will cover the rest.

### Comparison to Other Jurisdictions

To put the proposed increase into context, Nova Scotia’s licence fee is currently the second lowest in the country. With the increase in A-201, NS will become the third-lowest after NB and NL, which are not “full-service” Board offices. They tend not to do public trust engagements and have significantly lower production/fewer producers to manage. The closest comparison to NS is likely SK, which has a licence fee of \$1.87/100 kgs.

**Canadian Chicken  
Marketing Levies  
Order**

**3 (1)** A levy is hereby imposed on a producer per kilogram of live weight of chicken marketed by the producer in interprovincial or export trade, by reference to the province of production as follows:

- (a) in the province of Ontario, 2.71 cents;
- (b) in the province of Quebec, 2.27 cents;
- (c) in the province of Nova Scotia, 1.67 cents;
- (d) in the province of New Brunswick, 1.20 cents;
- (e) in the province of Manitoba, 2.46 cents;
- (f) in the province of British Columbia 2.06 cents;
- (g) in the province of Prince Edward Island, 2.11 cents;
- (h) in the province of Saskatchewan, 1.87 cents;
- (i) in the province of Alberta, 1.95 cents; and
- (j) in the province of Newfoundland and Labrador, 1.67 cents.

When converted to a total cost/producer, based on 2024 production data, Nova Scotia would remain the lowest in the country.
