

Quick Facts SASKATCHEWAN | 2022-2023 (Re)Settlement Program

IRCC's **Settlement Program** provides services that enable permanent residents (PR), including refugees and protected persons, to contribute to the economic, social, and cultural development needs of Canada.

IRCC's **Resettlement Program** (RAP) provides immediate essential services and financial support for government-assisted refugees (GAR) upon their arrival in Canada. Privately sponsored refugees (PSR) and blended visa office-referred (BVOR) refugees are eligible for limited RAP services at ports of entry.

(Re)Settlement services are funded through contribution agreements and delivered by third-party service provider organizations (SPOs).

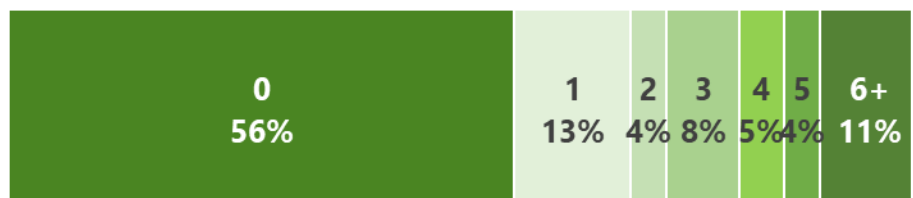

Since a client can receive multiple services, the sum of clients by service type may be higher than the total unique clients. The total unique clients counts each client only once regardless of how many services they have received.

11% of clients receiving (re)settlement services in Saskatchewan in 2022-2023 had been in Canada for 6 or more years.

Those receiving services beyond six years were largely refugees (40%) and sponsored family (31%).

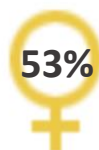


There were **923** Afghan clients (**4%**) and **2,775** Ukrainian clients (**11%**) in 2022-2023.



Without these clients, there would have been **22,303** clients of (re)settlement services, compared to **26,001**.

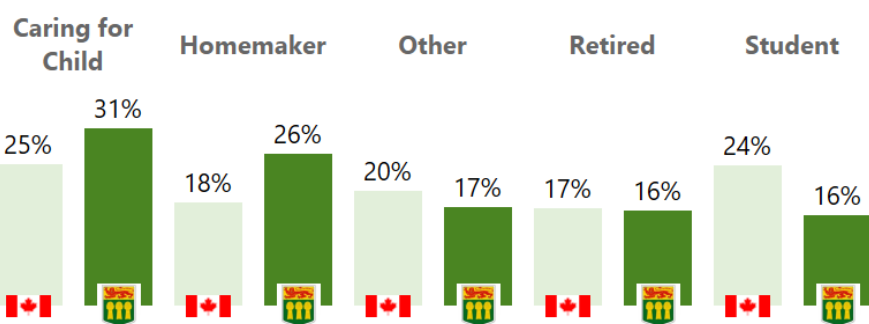
Currently Working



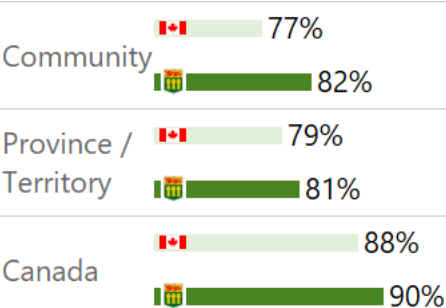
Working Full Time



Top Reasons for Not Working



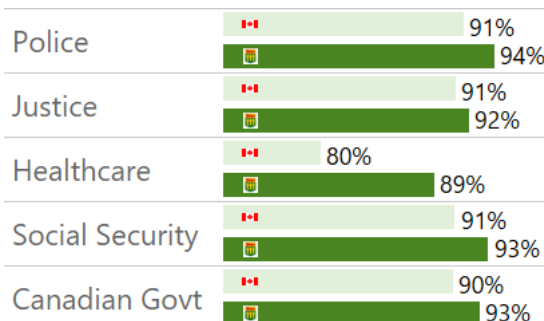
Sense of Belonging to ...

Data caveats and notes:

- Data includes pre-arrival and domestic settlement, resettlement assistance program, service delivery improvement, and pilot programs reported by IRCC-funded Service Provider Organizations located in Alberta.
- "Other" category includes Humanitarian category and Not Stated (Non PRs).
- "Refugees" includes Resettled Refugees and Protected Persons.
- Percentages may not add to 100% due to rounding.
- Knowledge of official languages is self-reported.
- Data reflects reporting by SPOs at the time of the tabulation. Reports, for the same period and different times, may contain slightly different data. This occurs due to on-going data entry by SPOs, resulting in changes. IRCC is actively reviewing data quality and integrity.
- Permanent resident data is preliminary and subject to change.
