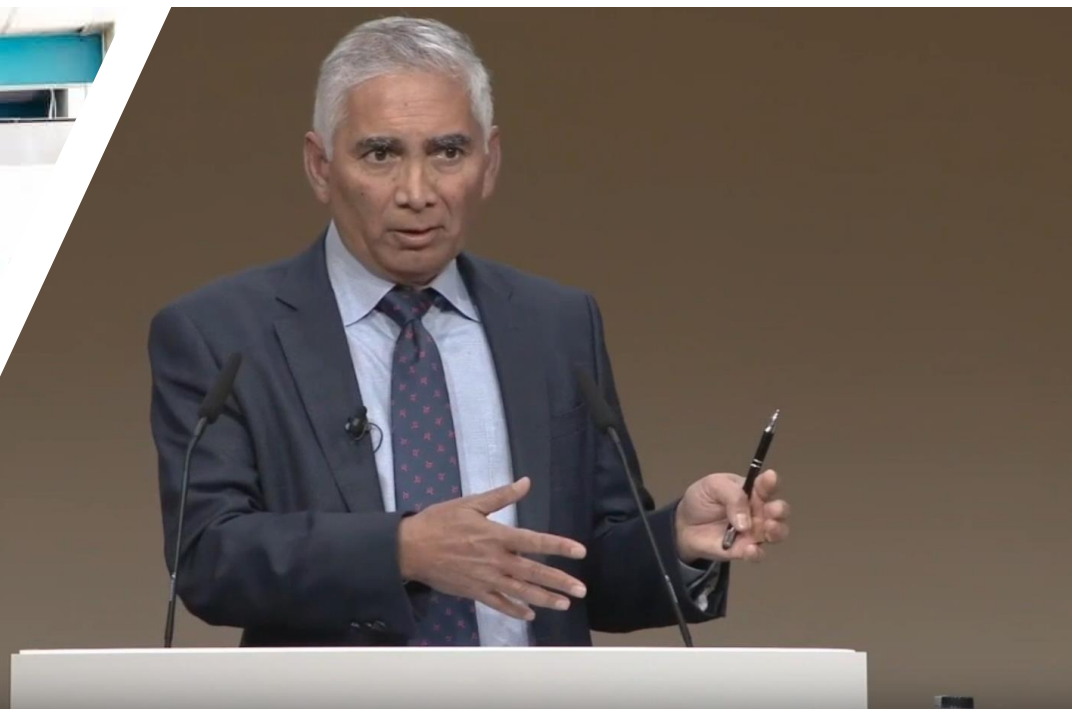

Research questions and methodology

- What are the transnational legal processes that shape mining governance?
 - How have Indigenous transnational norms shaped state laws and community responses to mining?
 - What forms of legal pluralism have emerged, and what legal imagination for justice can be built from these encounters?
- Collaborative research: Participant observation as a legal advisor and lawyer of Indigenous communities in Espinar, Cusco (2023-2024)

Comparative approach and legal pluralism

TLP framework: Extractive activities are increasingly regulated by transnational norms

Coloniality of power: Natural resources governance is structured by North – South relations

Legal traditions of Indigenous peoples: Extractive frontiers as sites of encounter where hybrid legal practices emerge (e.g. Industry-Indigenous agreements, and Indigenous-led extractive initiatives)
