### APPENDIX No. 13.

### REPORT OF THE ARCHITECT, ENGINEER BRANCH.

DEPARTMENT OF MILITIA AND DEFENCE, OTTAWA, 31st December, 1886.

SIR,-I have the honor to transmit herewith my Report upon works and repairs made to the military buildings and fortifications, under control of the Department, from 1st January last to date.

### London.

Plans and specifications were prepared by this Department, and contract awarded in April last to Messrs. Hook & Toll, contractors, London, for new Infantry School. Works are now in progress, the buildings being roofed in, and it is expected will be ready for occupation by 1st July, 1887.

The site of the buildings is within the city limits, about one mile from the post office, or business centre of the city, and contains about 541 acres, high, overlooking the city, and giving good facilities for drainage. The buildings are built of white brick on stone foundation with slate roofs with dressings of sandstone. The buildings are arranged to form three sides of a square connecting at angles; the front wing, facing the south, is 230 feet long, 36 feet average depth, and two storeys in height above ground, is arranged as residences for Commandant, Captain, Subalterns and attached Officers, Mess, Staff Offices and rooms for the necessary servants, all fitted with water supply, gas, water closets, baths, &c , and each residence has separate front entrance, and rear entrance to covered way in rear around the inner square, leading to all parts of the building.

The left hand or west wing, facing Elizabeth street, is 191 feet long, 42 feet 6 inches in depth, and two storeys in height above ground, with central arched entrance and tower over; this wing contains Sergeant Majors and Staff-Sergants' quarters, guard room, cells, prisoners' rooms, Sergeants' mess, and kitchen, workshops, canteen, hospital wards and kitchen, reading room, recreation room, lecture hall and museum.

The right hand, or east wing, is 183 feet long, 42 feet 6 inches in depth, and two storeys in height above ground, is divided into seven barrack rooms on each floor above ground, with store rooms, men's kitchen, cellars and dining room on basement floor.

It is intended to heat the buildings by steam, the boiler house 28 by 21 feet being built in rear of the front wing, and sunk 16 feet below ground, so as to admit of the steam pipes being carried in a tunnel below level of the basement floor. Water supply pipes from city works are arranged around the buildings, with hydrants, for use in case of fire.

Contracts for fencing, heating, grading and outbuildings have yet to be let-Local Architect and Inspector of Works, Mr. F. Durand.

### Toronto.

The new fence and gateways around New Fort Barracks, mentioned in my last report, have been completed by the contractor, Mr. Wm. Clarke.

Contract for the erection of four fuel stores to Officers' Quarters has been awarded to Messrs. Moss, Wilson & Howard, Toronto, and work is now in progress.

Extensive repairs have been made to sea wall, damaged by storms, and further repairs will be required to be provided for in next year's estimate. Other minor general repairs have been made to the several buildings at New and Old Forts.

### Hamilton.

The Drill Shed here was burnt down on 22nd May last. Contract for removing debris was awarded to Mr. Thos. Horn, Hamilton. Plans and specifications are now being prepared by this Department, and tenders will shortly be asked for the erection of new Drill Shed.

### Niagara.

Sundry repairs at Fort Mississagua, mentioned in my last report, have been completed by the contractor, Mr. A. Lockwood.

### Kingston.

At the Royal Military College a number of necessary repairs have been carried out, comprising general painting; outbuildings and fencing to Nos. 1 and 2 Officers' Quarters (lately No. 1); heating of dormitory building and No. 4 Officers' quarters by hot water; new entrance gates and piers; repairs to wharves; repairs to water supply from lake to pump house. Besides the above, a large number of minor repairs, as called for in the monthly barrack reports, have been executed.

Plans for a detached brick building for Cadets' Hospital have been prepared by

this Department, and tenders will be shortly asked for. Contractor for heating dormitory, &c.-Mr. Jamieson, Kingston; contractors for entrance gates, Messrs. Chown & Cunningham, Kingston; Local Inspector,

At Tête de Point Barracks a large number of minor repairs have been made to Sergt.-Major Birtles, R.M.C. water supply, drains, roofs, closets, windows, &c. Repairs to fencing around Riding

School have been made, and new privy, &c., erected. At Fort Henry repairs have been made to parapets, magazine floor, bridge over ditch, sea wall, and extensive minor repairs to storehouses and magazines, in advance battery; also to roadway to fort. Repairs have been made to store build-

At Fort Frederick, repairs have been made to entrance gates, magazine, tower ing, Ordnance yard.

floors, and pointing to gorge wall completed. Minor repairs have been made at Murney, Shoal, and Cedar Island towers. Local Architects and Inspectors to last mentioned works, Messrs. Power & Son,

At Artillery Park Barracks the gun shed, occupied by Kingston Field Battery, has been reshingled, and minor repairs made by Mr. Thomas Overend, contractor, Kingston.

### Ottawa.

At Nepean Point small arm magazine has been partly refloored, and repairs to

At Drill Shed, Cartier Square, Museum has been cleaned and kalsomined, and room next Museum fitted up as anti-room for Rifle Battalion. Sundry general boundary fence made. repairs have been made to this building, and dead trees around Cartier Square replaced. Drainage of basement to Caretaker's house has been improved.

At Militia Stores, Canal Basin, the roof has been repaired and painted, old heating furnace removed, old rain water tank converted into forge room.

Rear shed re-shingled, hoist repaired, platforms for guns and shot piles made, and new steps built from Sappers' Bridge down to store grounds, and sundry other repairs and improvements made.

At Rifle Range, Ottawa, a small addition to Caretaker's house has been made-

Mr. E. St. George, contractor.

### Prescott.

At Fort Wellington, sundry repairs have been made to chimneys, fencing, &c. At Drill Shed, surface drainage has been improved, and new fencing erected.

### St. John's, Quebec.

At Infantry Barracks the following works have been done: Repairs to slating: strengthening roofs; repairs to chimneys; boarding ceilings, in place of defective plastering; renewing staircases to men's quarters; improving outlets of drainage to river; providing winter sashes; water supply to guardhouse; providing hose and hose reels for fire purposes; pointing to outside walls, and other minor repairs. Local Inspector, Mr. E. J. Charlton.

### Chambly.

Repairs necessary for the proper preservation of the ruins of the Old Fort have been made. Mr. J. O. Dion, Local Inspector.

### Quebec.

At Citadel the contracts awarded to Messrs. Power, Juneau & Bigaouette for excavation and laying of water supply pipes from Quebec City Water Works into and around the Citadel from St. Louis street have been completed. Contractor for supply of pipes, Mr. J. Robertson, Montreal. Six hundred feet of fire hose and the necessary reels have also been provided. The contracts for branch supplies to the several buildings and the necessary fittings are now being gradually let in such manner as will cause the least inconvenience to the Force now occupying the Citadel. Contracts for the necessary alteration to Dalhousie Bastion closets has been awarded to Mr. A. Lortie, and for alteration to hospital closets to Mr. J. Maguire. Tenders are now being asked for water supply and drainage to other parts. Water supply to casements and drainage has been provided. Contract for completion of roofs over casemates has been awarded to Mr. F. de Varennes.

A new drain from the Citadel to the river has been laid down the cliff to avoid the many complaints of city and medical authorities of previous open drain. Chimneys to several of the casemates have been taken down and rebuilt. Extensive minor repairs and improvements to the several buildings, &c., at the Citadel have

been made.

On Esplanade new trees have been planted to replace those dead.

At Militia Offices, St. Louis street, the necessary repairs have been made by Mr. M. Hudon, contractor.

At Cartridge Factory a large number of minor repairs and improvements have been made by by Mr. J. Mathieu, contractor.

At Engineer Park considerable repairs to buildings, fencing and drainage have been done under contract.

Sundry repairs have been made at No. 2 Fort, Lévis. Inspector at Quebec and Levis, Mr. J. Mathieu, Jun.

### St. John, N.B.

At Drill Shed new armory floors have been laid and minor repairs made, and plank floor to main hall completed. Contractor for repairs, Mr. John Drury. Inspector, F. S. Hilyard.

At Fort Howe and Dorchester Batteries, Caretaker's house has been improved and repairs to magazine and arm shed, fencing, &c., made.

### Fredericton.

A large number of minor repairs and improvements have been made at Infantry School Barracks, Park Barracks and Drill Shed, including drainage, closets, water supply, plastering, windows, &c. Local Inspector, Mr. F. S. Hilyard.

### Winnipeg.

At Fort Osborne (Mounted Infantry Barracks) additional buildings have been erected, and others are in progress of erection, viz :- Hospital, Officers quarters, stabling: new fences around Barracks has been erected; and new drainage, water supply, and sidewalks provided and a large amount of minor repairs and alterations made to the old buildings all under contracts.

Local Architect and Inspector, Mr. W. Chesterton.

A large number of necessary repairs have been made to old wooden drill sheds

In your Annual Report for 1885 you spoke of the increasing importance of this in the several Provinces. branch and recommended an addition to the staff, but I am sorry to say that this recommendation was not acted on. As the duties of this branch are daily growing greater and the correspondence more voluminous, I beg to bring to your notice the urgent necessity of now making this addition to the staff, to enable the work to be carried on in a more systematic and therefore more satisfactory manner. When it is considered that the staff consists of only two it will readily be seen that when the plans, &c., of a new Drill Hall, Infantry School, or other large building, are in preparation, the other duties of the office are practically suspended.

### APPENDIX No. 14.

### GOVERNMENT CARTRIDGE FACTORY.

QUEBEC, 1st December, 1886;

Sir,-I beg to report upon operations at the Government Cartridge Factory for the year ending 1st December, 1886, as follows:

1,748,720 rounds of service ball ammunition have been manufactured. A number

of these were made of brass strip coiled.

The keeping qualities of this pattern have been tested comparatively with papered service Snider eartridges (Boxer pattern), in the following manner:

Packages of each description were placed in a cell exposed to the dampness produced by an intermittent jet of steam and remained so exposed during twenty five

The packages having been undone, the cartridges were at once ripped open with

care and examined.

All the brass coiled cases examined were found to contain powder in a perfectly serviceable state, only 30 per cent. of the papered cartridges were found serviceable, the remainder were damaged, and, in some cases the powder was reduced to a paste,

The paper covering of the Boxer pattern cartridge had acted as a sponge, absorbing and keeping the moisture in the packages until the whole became saturated.

From the above experiment the brass coiled cartridges appear to suffer less from damp than the ordinary pattern, and for annual supplies, no difficulty in this respect need be apprehended.

The coiled brass ammunition is now packed in ammunition boxes marked on the

top with a large C in red paint,

A quantity of blank ammunition has also been manufactured (520,000).

The converted blank cartridges are made from service ball ammunition rejected, from which the bullets have been extracted, served with a paper wad and top crimped.

They are not available for Martini-Henry Rifles or carbines as they do not extract easily after firing. They are to be used exclusively with the Snider rifle or carbine.

Boxes or barrels containing blank ammunition converted as above, are marked CD over the blue paper label. Cut-down service cartridges and paper cartridges are also made into blank ammunition. The latter are similar in pattern to the Regulation Blank cartridge Mark III. Both kinds are available for use with Martini-Henry and Snider arms. They are packed without distinguishing marks. A number of service cartridge cases made up to the point of finishing, are on hand; they may be filled when the present orders are completed. §

Artillery projectiles for use in the Dominion, have until now, been imported. Having been directed to prepare a number for experimental purpose, I took steps

to manufacture, at the Factory, some 9-pr. and 64-pr. M.L.R. shells.

In trying to obtain the castings from private firms in Quebec, it was found that, with the means at their disposal, they could not provide castings answering to our requirements.

I had therefore to get patterns, moulding boxes, core boxes, and other special apparatus made at the Factory workshop, succeeding finally after many rejections in getting a few shells cast sufficiently sound and true in shape for the preliminary trials.

The castings were received as they came out of the mould and finished by our

As the manufacture of studiess projectiles had not been undertaken in England for 9-pr. M.L.R., field guns, a gas check for these projectiles had to be designed here, giving sufficient bearing to the projections of the check in the rifling of the gun to ensure rotation and obviate shearing off, without weakening the base of the shell, diminishing its internal capacity, or lengthening it and so disturbing its centre of gravity. The 64-pr. shell had also to be provided with a gas check answering to the same requirements, and which was also designed here.

The intention in substituting gas checks for stude on projectiles for those guns, was to obtain greater range and accuracy, and also obviate the necessity of purchasing new machinery for this class of operations, if undertaken; as the present plant in the workshops was expected to be sufficient to finish studiess projectiles for even the

largest guns in the Dominion.

This has now proved to be quite possible.

The gas checks used for the 9-pr. projectiles are made of copper, cast nearly to figured dimensions, and turned or milled to exact measurements. The projections are milled to the required angle and shape by cutters, and several gas checks can be run through at a time. The exterior surface is also milled, and the interior surface finished to take the base of the shell allowing 01 inch of play round the base to

The 9-pr. studiess shrapnel shell takes the same gas check as the common ensure easy fitting. shell. The interior of the shell at its base is of a shape allowing enough metal to resist the shock of discharge, and forming a sufficiently large powder chamber. The length and weight of this shrapnel are slightly more than those of the Woolwich pattern, not enough, however, to interfere with the shooting. It contains the same number and description of bullets as the service pattern.

The gas checks of the 64-pr. studless shells manufactured at the Factory are also of copper, cast nearly to figured dimensions, subsequently milled and finished

to exact measurements, in a similar manner to that of the 9-pr shell. In connection with the manufacture of these shells, I have much pleasure in acknowledging the valuable assistance rendered by Mr. W. Dixon, foreman of the

Experimental practice with 9-pr. common studiess shell, manufactured at main Factory. Quebec, was commenced on the 11th March last, with very good results, on a range of 1,060 yards, measured off on the ice at the mouth of the St. Charles River, near Beauport Flats. A second experiment with a strengthened gas check took place on a measured range of 1,500 yards on the ice, the 30th March. Report hereunder:-

1st studless shell, 2 feet under, 1 foot to right. 1 do 57 do do 2nd direct line. do 93 do 3rd do hit. do 4th 1 foot to left. do 81 do 5th ricochet hit. do 25 do 6th direct hit. do 7th do

The "probable rectangle" obtained from the experiment is: Length 32.44 yards, breadth 1.88 yards. The studded shell at official trials: Length 50.11 yards, breadth 2.37 yards, at a range of 1,552 yards.

The elevation for 1,400 yards was found sufficient when firing at 1,500 yards measured range with the studless shells. Deflection nil, the wind slight, being

straight from the front. The strengthened gas checks answered very well.

The practice carried out with 9-pr. studless shells, in October last, by the Board of Officers appointed to report thereon, has corroborated the results of my previous experiments. The elevation of 3° 10' at which the Woolwich shells had been fired for a range of 1,600 yards had to be reduced to 3° 2', and for shrapnel the

9 - 15

elevation was 3° 6' instead of 3° 20' required for the studded shrapnel. The direction with both the 9-pr, and 64-pr, shells fired before the Board was perfect.

The practice with the studiess 64-pr. shells was also considered very good. The elevation given for the studiess shell for 1,600 yards was 3 degrees 5 minutes. An elevation of 3 degrees 26 minutes was required for the same range with studded 64. pr. common shell; a gain in range, as I would estimate, of about 150 yards.

Improvements have continued in the manufacturing machinery to perfect production, increase it and reduce hand labor. A water motor, designed by Messrs. Panet & Halle, both employed at the Factory, was set in the filling room at the

Laboratory to increase and improve the filling power of the machinery.

The water motor is very regular in its action and the result obtained in the filling is quite satisfactory, permitting to dispense with a third of the hands formerly

employed at this work.

The supply pipe for the motor is encased with the heating pipes. It would, however, be exposed to freeze in winter during the night, when steam is shut off, as it runs overground to the filling room, but a connection with the steam pump allows to empty the pipe after work.

Most of the water running waste from the water motor is used for the steam

boiler.

Water meters have been placed at the main Factory and at the Laboratory to register the quantity of water used for manufacturing purposes. The city corporation claims for water furnished will thus be brought to a perfect correspondence with the quantities consumed.

The Edison electric light machines and apparatus now in use for over eighteen months, continue to give satisfaction, a very small percentage of lamps having burnt

out, though most have exceeded their guaranteed time.

The steam engines and boilers at the main Factory, Laboratory and fulminate buildings are in good order. They have been thoroughly examined during the year and found in perfect condition, attributable to careful management and nearly exclusive use of water injectors.

The annual supply of raw material was received in good order. The quality of the articles answered to specification. The lead, brass and copper as well as the paper and other supplies, being equal to samples furnished to contractors.

Owing to the difficulty of obtaining transport for our supply of fulminates, I

had to take steps to ensure their manufacture in the country.

I succeeded in gettting the quantities required, which have been tested and found very effective in their action. Larger quantities can be produced when necessary for military or other purposes, viz., manufacture of percussion fuzes, detonators for submarine mining, &c.

Two lots of R. F. G. powder were obtained this year for manufacturing pur-

poses. The first in April and the second in November.

The powder received was subjected to a very strict examination and thorough tests. The density was determined by means of a Bianchi densimeter. The operation is conducted thus: A globe of glass, screwed to a stand, is connected with a vacuum pump by a strong rubber tube. When the vacuum in the glass globe has reached a determined point, mercury is allowed to fill the globe, compelled by atmospheric pressure depending on the perfection of the vacuum in the instrument.

The globe, closed by stop cocks, is then unscrewed from the stand and weighed filled with mercury. It is afterwards emptied, and a sample of 100 grammes of powder introduced in the globe, which is again connected to the vacuum pump and refilled with mercury. The globe is re-weighed, filled as it is with powder and mercury, the weight noted carefully and the density of the sample of powder in it, determined by formula

The test for determining the muzzle velocity of powder is performed at the fac-

tory with a Le Boulange ballistic chronograph.

This instrument, as set down at this establishment, consists of: (1.) The chronograph proper, placed in a room of the office buildings. (2.) A rifle on its rest placed in a wooden shooting shed about 90 yards from the office. (3.) A small iron target, suspended to an iron tripod placed in a pit 50 meters from the muzzle of the rifle, and both target and rifle are connected to the instrument by telegraph wires.

Electric batteries furnish distinct currents to the target and the rifle; a signal bell having also a distinct circuit to the shooting shed connecting the operator in the

instrument room with the man firing the rifle.

The chronograph is a brass upright supporting two electromagnets fixed on opposite sides and at unequal heights. One of the magnets, when in action, supports an armature (rod) called the "chronometer," and the other magnet, an armature (rod) shorter than the first, called the "registrar."

A third active element of the instrument is the "indenter," placed horizontally at the foot of the upright and set on a spring, to be released by the fall of the

" registrar."

Suspending both armatures, the signal bell is rung, and on firing the rifle a wire at its muzzle is broken, the "chronometer" circuit interrupted, and the "chronometer" falls vertically. The arrival of the bullet on the target interrupts the "registrar's" circuit, the registrar falling releases the "indenter," carrying a circular knife which springs forward and strikes the falling "chronometer." A zinc tube, with which the latter is covered, receiving an indent, which will appear the higher up on chronometer rod, that more time has elapsed between the rapture of the two circuits, i.e., the passage of the bullet from the rifle to the target.

To compensate for the time of demagnatising the electro-magnets and other retarding causes in the apparatus, a constant allowance is made, equivalent to 0.15

sec. time of falling of the "chronometer," in the readings.

A "disjunctor" is used in connection with the instrument to ascertain if the latter is properly set. The "disjunctor" interrupts when released both currents at the same time. The "indenter" should then strike the "chronometer" at a point 110.37 m.m. above the origin (zero of the scale).\*

A scale is provided with the instrument which reads the heights of fall from which are deduced the velocities observed and, by formula  $\frac{d^2}{W}$ S, the muzzle

velocities.

A chemical analysis of the ingredients of the powder received at the Factory is

It consists in testing the undissolved ingredients (sulphur and charcoal) by heat also peformed.

in tubes, and on platinum foil.

The characteristic fumes of sulphur are readily detected, and charcoal burns slowly away. Any residue after the charcoal has disappeared consists of ash and incombustible impurities.

The dissolved parts, viz, nitre and soluble impurities, are tested for: 1st, potash; 2nd, nitric acid; 3rd, chlorides; 4th, sulphates; 5th, lime; the three latter tests are for impurities, chlorides being the most detrimental; nitre must be free from them.

The hygroscopic test is important to ascertain power of resistance to moisture. Dried samples of powder are placed in a box which closes hermetically, and is protected externally by non-conducting material.

<sup>\*</sup> The above disjunction reading is not correct in the latitude of Quebec. The variation of gravity is determined by formula  $g = \omega$  (1-0.002588 cos. 2  $\lambda$ .)

A solution of salpetre charges the air in the box with moisture. The samples thus exposed to moisture are each weighed at regular intervals of time, to determine

the quantity absorbed by each.

Powder in its normal state should not contain more than 1 per cent, of moisture. To find if this percentage is exceeded a small quantity of crushed powder, is placed between close fitting watch glasses and weighed. It is placed under a jar, exposed to the dissicating effect of oil of vitroil and weighed from time to time until an unvarying weight is obtained.

The shape, the size of grains, the proportions of the different sizes, form also subjects of enquiry. The size of grain is determined by sifting a thoroughly mixed

sample of powder on sieves of a fixed number of meshes to the lineal inch.

Though a doubt is attached to the value of flashing powder as a comparative test for incorporation, it is however still resorted to. A badly worked powder or a sample that had suffered from damp would readily be detected by this test.

A number of cartridges filled with powder from each lot examined are fired with Snider Enfield rifles from Whitworth rests, on targets at 500 yards range and the

grouping carefully noted on diagrams kept of record.

This is the most important test in determining the serviceableness of powder. Others are only indicative of results that may be obtained with the powder in manufacture.

Last winter some proposed alterations in the bullet machinery led to ascertain experimentally the action of the clay plug in the Snider bullet fired from the service rifles, using butts of snow to avoid distorting the bullets which were shot into them and afterwards recovered. A butt of soft snow was formed 7 to 8 feet thick and the bullets fired into it from a distance of 42 yards, some at 18 inches from the top, others lower down. Those fired towards the top passed through and were found on the snow 10 to 12 feet off. When fired about 4 feet from the top, the bullets lodged 4 to 5 feet in the butt.

In very light snow such as banked up by the wind, the bullets travelled through about 20 feet, ricocheted upwards and fell from 12 to 15 feet further. In damp and thawing snow bullets fired 6 yards off penetrated 4 to 5 inches and were considerably

deformed, flattened and some turned inside out.

A number of bullets both of English and Canadian manufacture were recovered in perfect condition during those experiments and were found bulged out to the full diameter of lands and grooves of the rifle; they were set up from 1.04 inch to 1.01 inch, having lost 100 of an inch in length, indicating to what extent the determination of length and shape of soft metal projectiles must be a matter of experiment.

The clay plugs had been forced a variable distance up the recess of the base of

the bullets.

The expanded base of bullets fired from long Snider Enfield rifles (3 grooved) had a triangular shape; those fired from (5 grooved) short Snider Enfield had

remained nearly circular at the base.

The cannelures in all cases had become obliterated and a quantity of wax still adhered in the bottom of the cannelures, limiting thus the favorable action attributable to the cannelures, according to certain theorists, on the trajectory of Snider bullets.

The usual tests have been applied to the ammunition during the year. The annual figure of merit, calculated from the total of figures of merit of targets fired

during the year is 15.35 inch.

Careful attention to the temperature in the filling rooms, and improvements in machinery, have made it possible to reduce the variations in charge to a limit of one grain in 93 to 95 per cent, of the cartridges, and about 5 to 7 per cent. are within a limit of 1 to 13 grain. A variation of 2 grains is allowed at Woolwich in filling Martini-Henry ammunition, and 4 grains were allowed for Snider. R.F.G. powder absorbs moisture readily; uniformity of weight in the charge can only be secured by filling at a constantly even temperature, however perfect the machinery and

however perfect the powder of its kind. Hence, the difficulty of obtaining unvariable charges in the ordinary course of manufacture. Nor would extreme accuracy on this point, though of course desirable, be of practical value when other uncontrollable causes of irregularity in range are considered. As a matter of experiment, rounds of specially prepared ammunition with charges of 68, 69, 70, 71 and 72 grains of powder respectively, fired from fixed rests at 500 yards, gave a vertical deviation of only 4 inches and 16, on a target, between the highest and lowest charges; entirely bearing out the results obtained by mathematical calculations.

The personnel of the factory has not varied in average number of employés. The only increase to the permanent staff was by the appointment of Lieut Jno G. Hearn (late of Royal Military College, Kingston) as Assistant Superintendent This officer completed a course of several months at the Royal Arsenal, Woolwich, and on

his return assumed his present duties. Several repairs and attentions authorized to the buildings in my charge have been put in hand and are now being performed. The outdoor work was commenced very late in the season, and I beg to suggest that future repairs may be done earlier

The addition of skylights to the workshop has very much improved it, giving

plenty of light which was required for the kind of work performed,

A hot water apparatus, formerly used at the Laboratory and replaced by a more efficient one, was removed and fitted into the office buildings by the Factory workmen. Valuable instruments which suffered from extremes of temperature during winter will now be protected, and the personnel employed at office work will perform their duties with more comfort.

To meet further enquiries that might be made in the matter of manufacturing artillery projectiles, the site of a carronade battery adjacent to the factory workshop has been examined, and tracings and estimates prepared for the construction of a foundry in connection with this Government establishment. An area of 600 square feet could be cheaply covered in on the proposed site, which would be quite sufficient

Line-shafting could be run from the workshop to the foundry and work the cupola blowers, &c., thus manufacturing under very economical conditions, as the

steam power would be borrowed from the adjacent factory. There are quantities of old east iron guns and spherical projectiles in the country, useless at present for military purposes, which could be utilized to manufacture Artillery projectiles for rifled ordnance, reducing the expense of annual supplies to the Artillery of the Dominion.
