Dear Prime Minister

I understand that your government has recently announced reviews of several environmental and regulatory processes, including the EA process, modernization of the National Energy Board (NEB), as well as reviews of the Fisheries Act and the Navigation Protection Act.

The vast majority of Canadian resource companies have proven their ability to both protect the environment at the same time as they are protecting our standard of living and providing many Canadians from across the country with honest, well-paying jobs.

We all need to work together to ensure that our environment and our economy are protected now and in the future. It is imperative that your government demonstrates the leadership needed to fulfill this responsibility and protect Canada and Canadians' interests, and the economy that sustains our standard of living and allows us to continue to be one of the best places on the planet to call home. .
